### STEM SIGNUP

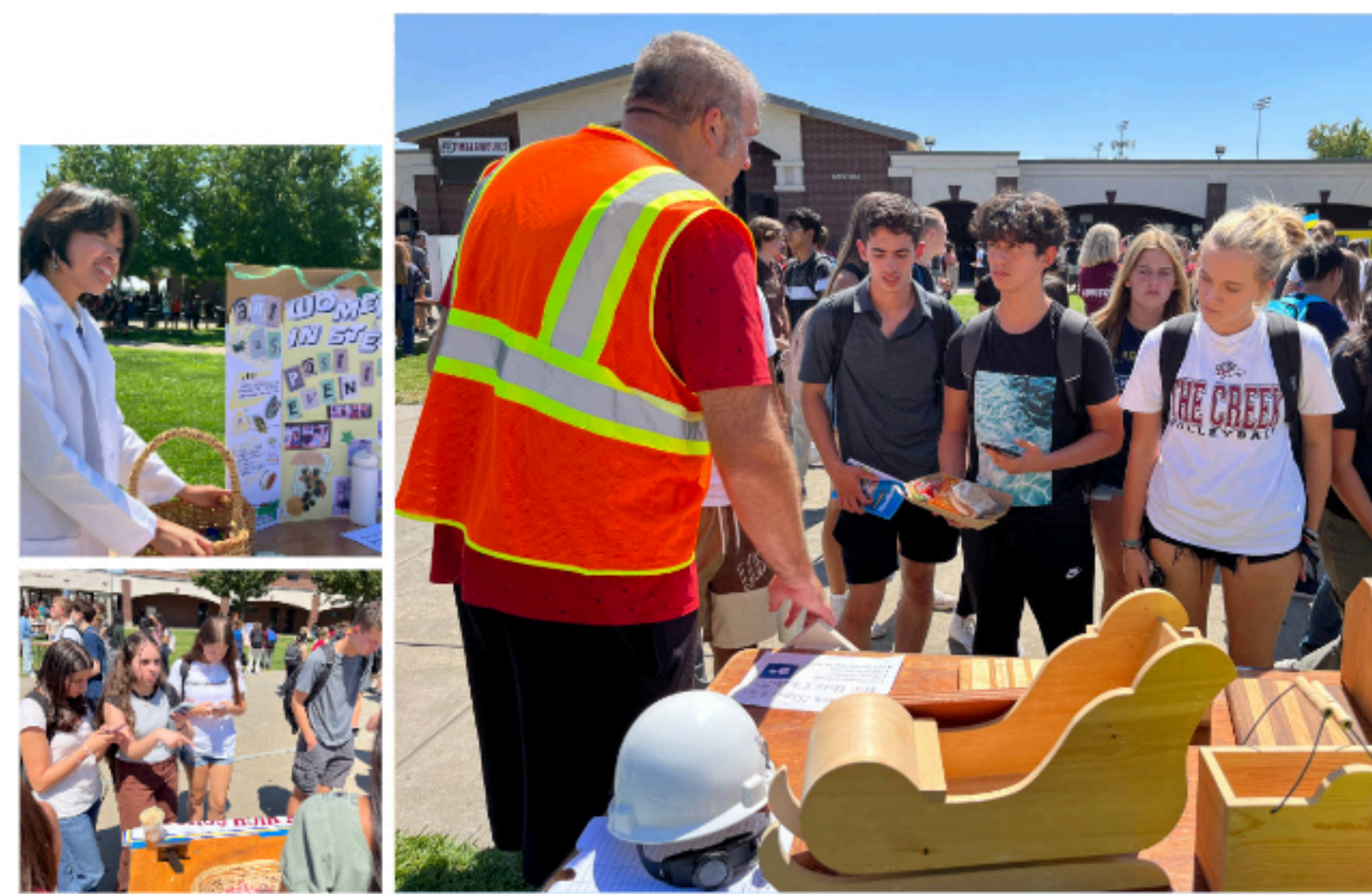

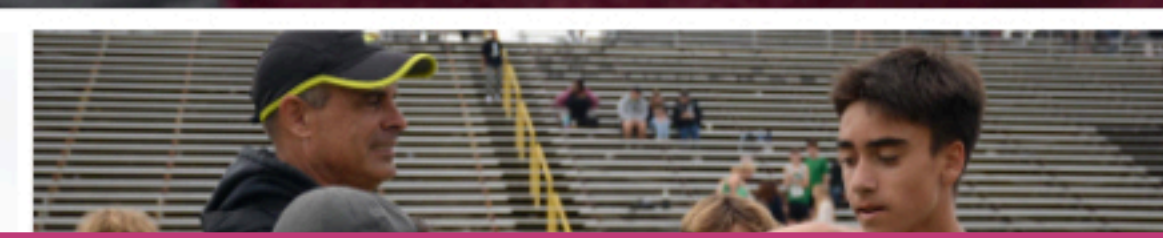
