

• • • • Math is always something that has been reliable to BHARGAVA KANAKAPURA '24, and it is the path he hopes to pursue in the future. So over the summer he decided to email a research director at USC, to get on a project, helping to model wildfires. He chronicles his experience: "I was doing my own things specifically looking at the factors that allowed it to spread that far. It was more of a system statistical analysis. Their project was predicting by making a next day model." In addition to helping with the research project, he took advanced math classes at the University of Illinois, Urbana Champaign. He was in classes with college underclassmen, doing math to supplement his math resume. KANAKAPURA cites this as a vital

step in learning more about what he wants to specialize in, for the future: "I wanted to take more advanced math classes. They have this one thing for college kids called Math Map. Because it's only for college kids, I basically asked my research mentor, whether I could enroll in this class. And then he talked to the professor of that class, so I could be enrolled." The process was an important learning experience for him, preparing him for future projects and the college experience. When asked about what other students should do to also gain these experiences, he said, "If you're in high school, you can just find out if professors are doing research internships, and you just email them and see if they're willing to take you on board."
